STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Praise Chapel is a charitable company limited by guarantee. It is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association and controlled by a Board of Trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purposes of charity law.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New Trustees are selected on the basis of the contribution they will make to the governance of the organisation and the skills they will contribute. They are provided with copies of the Charity Commission's guidance to trustees and given an introduction to the activities of the charity by the existing board members.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company under review was the advancement of the Christian religion.

Risk management

The trustees have addressed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to specific operational areas of the charity and its finances. The trustees believe that by monitoring reserve levels, by ensuring controls exist over key financial systems and by examining the operational and business risks faced by the charity, they have established effective systems to mitigate those risks.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2014

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity has two main objectives:

- · the advancement of the Christian religion worldwide
- · the relief of poverty worldwide

It pursues these objectives by operating a centre for Christian worship at Sidings Community Centre, 150 Brassey Road, Kilburn, London; its current offices at The Mill House, Columbia Avenue, Edgware and through a programme of events aimed at reaching out to the unchurched together with a range of community-based projects.

In addition to our regular Sunday and Midweek services we also held various outreach events throughout the year for public worship, pastoral care and spiritual, moral and intellectual development, both for the congregation and for anyone else who wishes to benefit from what the Church offers and to promote the Christian faith. The church offers a place where lives can be restored, refreshed and revived. We also hold regular training sessions which not only invest in people but also help to underpin the various services and events that take place across the year and ensure that the church runs effectively and efficiently.

September 2013 marked the twentieth anniversary of the Church. Praise Chapel began as a bible study fellowship at a home in Finchley Central, a suburb in North London with a handful of people. After a few weeks the group outgrew the home it was meeting in and as a result they moved into Sidings Community Centre in Kilburn, North-West London. It began to hold weekly church services and other activities to serve and minister to the local community and other areas around London.

The Twentieth Anniversary was celebrated with special services over three days. The first service was a general service attended by representatives from several churches, ministries and some Christian charities that the church has been involved with over the years such as Compassion UK and Samaritans Purse. The second service was held to showcase some of the work the church does in the local community which includes Kidz Klub; our outreach to children aged 4-10 years, Mums Klub; our outreach to mothers and Sparkles; our outreach to the care homes for senior citizens. This service was attended by members of the community and a special guest from Brent's Mayor's Office who gave the keynote speech. A highlight of the day was testimonials shared by two young people who emphasised how the church activities for children and youth had helped them to make good choices for their career paths in Medicine and Human Resources. The third service was a special thanksgiving and awards ceremony during which some of the volunteers and members of staff who had served in various capacities over the years were honoured for their faithfulness and commitment.

Our Annual Report for 2012-13 gave a general view of our work in our three core areas of activity: the Community, the City and the Continents of the World. Praise Chapel's impact continues to grow in these areas. This year we want to use our report to focus on our ongoing work to Families, Youth and the local Community.

Ministry to Families

Praise Chapel continues to invest time and resources to support and assist families through various activities which include our quarterly Super Sunday Services; during which principles are taught to enhance various aspects of family life. Another activity is our Couples Enrichment Weekend, which involves married couples enjoying a weekend away with practical teaching on married life, fellowship and specialised question and answer sessions. Our annual family conference, 'As For Me And My House', is also another avenue where families are ministered to through specialised teaching sessions and workshops for children, youth and adults over a four day period. This year due to the growing need for children to be adopted we included a special session on adoption and fostering during the conference. Our Multigenerational services, which are also held quarterly, bring together adults and youth in a special worship service which is also designed to empower and enrich the members with family life principles. Our Family Development Centre, continues to offer professional counselling services to individuals and families alike.

Ministry to Teens and Young People

The Church continues to equip teenagers through teaching and discussion groups during their Teens In Christ (TIC) sessions. During their weekly Sunday morning sessions and Friday Open House activities, the young people have the opportunity to explore a variety of topics from a biblical viewpoint. Youth workers ensure that examples and illustrations are drawn from a contemporary context whilst emphasising the eternal validity of scriptural doctrine.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Route 1:8, the new name for Youth Plus our ministry to young adults aged (18-25 years), continues to grow. This year some of the activities put together included a session to prepare and support those going to university for the first time and a book club event during which different subjects on spirituality, relationship and career development were discussed and explored.

Ministry in the Local Community

Our outreaches in the local community continue to grow as we reach out to the elderly in our community, through the activities held at Lauriston Lodge. This year our team of volunteers continued with its fortnightly visits on Thursday evenings. The activities they focus on include bible studies, sharing of testimonies and singing various worship songs. The team always provide light refreshments and celebrates the birthdays of all the elderly residents who attend. A highlight of the year is the Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch, which was celebrated again this year. Elderly people from the local community and others from further afield come to dine, dance and sing Christmas carols.

Our Kidz Klub outreach to children aged 5-11 in the local area continues to be an important part of the churches activities. The sessions are held every last Saturday of the month and are fun-filled with games, music as well as object and life lessons which are acted out based on the theme of the month.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The charity continues to explore ways of reaching out and spreading the gospel of Christ in an effective manner within the community. As we celebrate all we have been able to do, we are excited about the new opportunities to serve our community and beyond in the coming year.
