Structure, Governance and Management

LCTP was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 9th April 2002 under the name of Carlisle and Blackburn Diocesan Training Institute. It was registered with the Charity Commission from 22nd July 2004. Its governing document is its Memorandum and Articles of Association. By Special Resolution of its members the name was changed to Lancashire and Cumbria Theological Partnership on 4th September 2007.

The business of LCTP is managed by its Council of Management who are the Directors for the purposes of the Companies Acts. The members of Council who have served during the year are listed on page 1.

Historically, LCTP always had a close association with the University of Cumbria (formerly St Martin's College). In recognition of this an agreement was made with effect from 2nd November 2006 between the Diocesan Boards of Finance of Carlisle and Blackburn and the University of Cumbria to restructure LCTP. As a result, the membership of LCTP was changed so that the two Diocesan Boards of Finance remained members and the University of Cumbria appointed two members.

Following this change of members, the two Diocesan Boards of Finance each nominated two members of Council and the University of Cumbria nominated four members of Council. All other members of Council not thereby nominated resigned.

In 2016, it was agreed by the two Dioceses and the University that LCTP would operate on behalf of and be controlled in full, going forward, by the Diocese of Carlisle. On 31st August 2016, those members and Directors representing the Blackburn Diocese and the University of Cumbria resigned, and on 1st September seven new Trustees were appointed.

LCTP in now operating under the name of 'Cumbria Christian Learning' and this change of name will soon be recognised legally. In the future, as Cumbria Christian Learning, the charity will provide the full range of ministerial learning and development activities for Carlisle Diocese. It will also provide some learning and development support to other partners in the ecumenical county of Cumbria, including the Methodist and United Reformed churches.

No Member of Council has any beneficial interest in the Company.

The Council of LCTP monitors and assesses the major risks faced by the Company. Regular reporting by the Principal to the Council enables potential problems to be identified at an early stage. A fully documented risk assessment and management strategy is in place in order to mitigate the impact of the risks faced by LCTP.

Objectives and Activities

LCTP's principal objective is to prepare men and women for all categories of Ordained Ministry and accredited Lay Ministry and to assist in the preparation of men and women for Reader Ministry. It provides training courses which are, where appropriate, academically validated through the University of Cumbria and Durham University.

It aims to encourage and enable the Church in the Diocese of Carlisle, (and historically Blackburn, Bradford) and throughout the area to explore and discover those forms of ministry most appropriate to rapidly changing social and economic conditions both nationally and regionally. It also aims to encourage candidates to develop new styles of ministry recognising both the Christian tradition and the context of ministry.

COUNCIL'S REPORT FOR THE 16 MONTHS ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016 (continued)

Objectives and Activities (Continued)

In considering how the objectives of LCTP are achieved the trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, principally with regard to the advancement of religion but also for the advancement of education. Graduates of LCTP programmes enter public ministry at different levels in a variety of institutions and remain subject to the guidance given on public benefit which is, in turn, reported on by those institutions.

Achievements and Performance

In the 16 months to 31st December 2016 LCTP undertook significant work to prepare for its new role of delivering an integrated approach to vocations and learning and development provision for mission and ministry in Cumbria in support of the Diocesan Strategy God for All. In its new role LCTP will provide all learning and development provision for Carlisle Diocese, including that which was previously provided directly by the Diocesan Training Team. Preparing for this change in 2016 included reviewing governance, agreeing new priorities with the Diocesan Bishop's Council, developing a staffing structure and recruiting new staff, reviewing provision and developing a new financial model.

Among the first programmes that LCTP delivered for the Diocese in 2016 were new programmes of learning and development for the first cohort of Leaders in Mission Communities and establishing and resourcing a network of Mission Communities' Consultants and Critical Friends. LCTP also contributed significantly to a review of the arrangements for curacies in Carlisle Diocese and will be responsible for managing the implementation of that review as well as implementing the Diocesan Vocations initiative.

During the period LCTP continued to deliver a range of programmes for Readers, curates and ordination trainees validated by the University of Cumbria and Durham University. As part of this, in the period to August 2016 LCTP "taught-out" the remaining students from Blackburn Diocese on the Church of England's Common Awards programme in advance of Blackburn's withdrawal from LCTP.

Financial Review

These Financial Statements cover a period of 16 months to 31st December 2016, following the allignment of the Charity's year-end with that of its ultimate parent company, the Carlisle Diocesan Board of Finance Ltd.

In what has been a challenging period, and one of significant change for LCTP, the 16 months to 31 December 2016 saw the charity incur a deficit of £83,637. This reflected a significant fall in income as a result of the planned "teaching-out" of students from Blackburn Diocese and the time lag in recruiting new students from Carlisle Diocese. Expenditure on staff remained significant because of the need to maintain capacity to teach the remaining ordination students alongside beginning to deliver new requirements for Carlisle Diocese. The Diocese of Blackburn honoured their commitment to support LCTP in this transitional period through a donation of £34,073. Costs were kept to a minimum during this period of transition.

Council believes that sufficient reserves should be held to support the ongoing activities of LCTP and ensure that liabilities can be paid when they fall due. Historically the major source of income came from fees which tend to be received termly. Therefore, sufficient reserves need to be maintained to cover up to one term's worth of expenditure (approximately £46,000).

At 31st December 2016, the balance of unrestricted funds available had moved to become a deficit of £65,863. However, the Diocese of Carlisle has made a commitment to make grant funding available to LCPT during its transitional phase to ensure that it has sufficient working capital at all times.

The Financial Statements which follow comply with the governing document and have been prepared in accordance with the Charity Accounting Regulations and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities".

COUNCIL'S REPORT FOR THE 16 MONTHS ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016 (continued)

Statement of Council's Responsibilities

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and of the income and expenditure of the Company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently:
- b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- c) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF LANCASHIRE AND CUMBRIA THEOLOGICAL PARTNERSHIP

I report on the accounts of the company for the period ended 31 December 2016, which are set out on pages 1 to 11.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE 16 MONTHS ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1 Statement of Accounting Policies

The accounts of LCTP are prepared in accordance with the Charities and Companies Acts, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2015 (the Charities SORP), and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). These accounts are drawn up on the historical cost accounting basis and the following paragraphs describe the specific policies adopted for the recognition of significant categories of incoming resources and expenditure.

Fees and similar income

Fees receivable and charges for services are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided.

Resources expended

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Overhead and other costs not directly attributable to a particular activity are apportioned over the relevant categories on the basis of management estimates, either by reference to staff time or space occupied as appropriate. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.
