## **Directors' report**

The directors present their report and the consolidated financial statements of GSA Capital Services Limited and its subsidiaries (together the "Group" or "GSA") for the year ended 31 March 2019.

#### **Principal activity**

The principal activity of GSA Capital Services Limited (the "Company") is to provide various support services to GSA Capital Partners LLP (the "LLP"), of which the Company is a member.

The LLP is a limited liability partnership incorporated in England & Wales and is authorised and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority in the United Kingdom ("FCA") and is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"), the Commodities Futures Trading Commission ("CFTC") and the National Futures Association ("NFA") in the United States of America.

The LLP is an authorised Alternative Investment Fund Manager under the Alternative Investment Managers' Directive (Directive 2011/61/EU).

The LLP provides investment management and investment advisory services to a range of investment funds.

Together GSA Capital Services Limited, GSA Capital Partners LLP, GSA Capital Partners (Hong Kong) Limited, GSA Capital Partners (New York) LP, GSA Capital Partners (USA) LP, GSA NYGP Limited, GSA PEV LP and Green Park Research Limited constitute the "Group".

#### Charitable donations

As part of the Group's commitment to the communities in which it operates, contributions totalling £17,610 (2018: £14,250) were made during the year to charities registered in the United Kingdom.

#### **Directors**

The current directors are shown on page 1.

In addition, Dean Gregory was a director until 31 December 2018 when he resigned.

#### Dividend

The directors have not declared or paid any dividend during the year (2018: £nil).

## Strategic report

The directors present their Strategic report of the Group for the year ended 31 March 2019.

#### Review of the business

The Board monitors the performance of the Group, using a number of financial measures, on a regular basis. A number of these measures for the Group for the year ended 31 March 2019 are shown below:

The outcome of the Referendum of the U.K.'s Membership of the European Union (referred to as Brexit) continues to be uncertain. The Board regularly monitor and consider the potential implications of Brexit on the Group and Company.

The Board also monitor the performance of the Group regularly using non-financial performance measures including investment performance and investment risk alongside analysis of compliance and regulatory issues.

The Group's Pillar 3 capital disclosure document shall be found on the Group's website: www.gsacapital.com.

#### Results

The Group profit for the year after taxation, was £32,934,728 (2018: £88,623,968) and is shown in the Group statement of comprehensive income on page 10. The LLP has made distributions to its members during the year. The profit of the Company after taxation was £3,419,326 (2018: £2,938,016).

## Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risk affecting the Group is a material reduction in assets under management, which in turn can lead to a reduction in fee income. Assets under management will vary over time due to the performance of each investment fund and investor subscriptions and redemptions.

Other key risks relate to the Group's ability to attract and retain key investment management personnel.

### Going concern

The Company's activities are set out in the applicable sections of the Directors' report. The financial position and the liquidity of the Group and Company are reflected in their Statement of financial position on pages 14 and 15 respectively.

The Company has sufficient financial resources and ongoing investment management contracts. As a consequence, the directors believe that the Company is well placed to manage its business risks successfully. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus, they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements.

## Notes to the financial statements

at 31 March 2019

### 1. Accounting policies

The principle accounting policies are summarised below. They have all been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

#### Statement of compliance

GSA Capital Services Limited is a limited liability company incorporated in England and Wales. The Registered Office is at Stratton House, 5 Stratton Street, London, W1J 8LA.

The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102 as it applies to the financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 March 2019 and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable UK accounting standards. The financial statements are prepared in Sterling which is the functional and presentational currency of the Group and the Company.

#### Basis of consolidation

The Group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiary undertakings (GSA Capital Partners LLP, GSA Capital Partners (Hong Kong) Limited, GSA Capital Partners (New York) LP, GSA Capital Partners (USA) LP, GSA NYGP Limited, GSA PEV LP and Green Park Research Limited) all of which are drawn up to 31 March 2019. All material inter-company transactions and balances have been eliminated in the group financial statements. No income or cash flow statement is presented for GSA Capital Services Limited as permitted by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

#### Tangible fixed assets

All tangible fixed assets are recorded at historical cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings – the shorter of 5 years or lease term Leasehold improvements – the shorter of 5 years or lease term

Computer equipment – over 3 years

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

#### Investments

Investments in subsidiaries are included at cost less provision for any impairment in value. Unlisted investments are recognised at fair value by using the net asset value at the reporting date as provided by the third party administrator of the fund. Changes in fair value are recognised in the income statement. Realised gains/(losses) arising on disposal of investments are calculated on a first in first out basis and are expensed in the Income statement.

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Group's Statement of financial position when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Trade debtors are measured at fair value on initial recognition. Appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts are recognised in the Income statement when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at banks and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less.

#### Financial instruments (continued)

Derivative financial assets and liabilities are measured at fair value through profit or loss, and are classified as held-for-trading.

The Group's derivative instruments do not qualify for hedge accounting, and changes in the fair value of derivative financial instruments are recognised in the Income statement as they arise.

When a foreign currency forward contract is settled, the Group records a realised gain or loss equal to the difference between the value of the contract at the time it was opened and the value of the contract at the time it was settled.

#### Trade creditors

Trade creditors are initially measured at fair value, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

#### **Provisions**

Provisions for dilapidations are recognised when the Group enters a lease agreement that legally obligates the Group to a probable cash outflow at the end of the lease term. Such outflows are the best estimate of cost at current market rates and are charged to the Income statement over the period of the lease term.

Provisions for onerous contracts are recognised when the unavoidable costs of meeting the obligations under the contract exceed the economic benefits expected to be received from it.

#### Lease commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Income statement on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### Taxation and Deferred taxation

Corporation tax is provided at amounts expected to be paid (or recovered) using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

The charge for taxation is based on the profit or loss for the year and takes into account taxation deferred because of timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. Deferred taxation is provided using the liability method on all timing differences, calculated at the rate at which it is anticipated the timing differences will reverse based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantially enacted at the reporting date. Deferred tax assets are recognised only when, on the basis of available evidence, it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

## Foreign currencies

## Company

Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into Sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the reporting date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into Sterling at the rate of exchange ruling in the month of the transaction.

### Group

Foreign exchange differences on monetary and non-monetary items are taken to the Income statement while foreign exchange differences on consolidation are taken to the Group statement of comprehensive income.

Each entity in the Group determines its own functional currency and items included in the Financial statements, of each entity, are measured using that functional currency. The assets and liabilities of overseas subsidiary undertakings are translated into the presentational currency at the rate of exchange ruling at the reporting date. comprehensive income are translated into Sterling at the rate of exchange ruling in the month of the transaction. All resulting exchange differences are recognised in the Group statement of comprehensive income.

#### **Turnover**

Turnover represents fees receivable for investment management services and investment advisory services provided. Management and performance fees are recognised when the Group obtains the right for consideration in exchange for its performance of services. Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received, excluding VAT.

#### Other income

Other income is recorded on an accruals basis. Included in Other income are recharges of: research costs, sub-lease income and employee income protection settlements.

After the introduction of MiFID II on 3 January 2018 the LLP was required to contract directly with third party research providers, for the benefit of the investment funds, who in turn fund the LLP to cover the expense. The research income and research expense are deemed independent services, recorded on an accruals basis in Other income and Administration expenses respectively. The research income and research expense for the year was £19,425,891 (2018: £736,152).

In 2015 the Group entered a sub-letting agreement on an office ending 3 October 2018. The Group recorded sublease rental income on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Sublease income, including rent and service charge of £194,579 was recorded within Other income for this sublease for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Group expects to receive sublease rental payments of £nil in the year ended 31 March 2020.

#### Expenses

Expenses are recognised on an accruals basis.

#### Pensions and other post-retirement benefits

Contributions to defined contribution schemes are recognised in the Income statement in the period in which they become payable.

#### Other long-term employee benefits

Non-performance related awards: the cost of the deferred awards are recorded as an expense in the Income statement as incurred, with a corresponding liability in the Statement of financial position. ### 21. Related party transactions
