STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a memorandum and articles of association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. The liability of the members in the event of the Charity being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £10.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees will appoint Individuals with the appropriate skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the charity.

Induction and training of new trustees

The trustees will have full knowledge of the Charity Commission's book, "The Essential Trustee: What you need to know"

Organisational structure

The Charity is run by the trustees as no staff are employed.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal Objects of the company were :-

The acquisition of the surplus property and assets of Greenbank Drive Hebrew Congregation, including the adoption and in particular to "secure the conservation, maintenance, operation and management of Long Lane Cemetery and its buildings, memorials and other physical features for the public benefit for the purpose of burial of Jews, including arranging and supervising of such burials and the consecration of tombstones, all according to the principles of the Jewish religion"

The company's aims and objectives for the year are to run the Cemetery.

Significant activities

There were four funerals at Long Lane during the year, and the average cost of a funeral is now £3,250, which is considerably lower than that of Manchester, and the equivalent of what members are paying for in Springwood.

We have an ongoing responsibility for insurance at both Long Lane and the old cemetery at Green Lane, and also for the old synagogue building, in order to maintain its value. The comprehensive insurance cover for the old synagogue building was unsustainable to manage, and therefore the Trustees now have a more limited policy.

The Cemetery at Long Lane was purchased in 1927 by the former Hope Place Shul and carries on to this day under their ownership, and their successor congregation, namely Greenbank Drive Hebrew Congregation.

The records are now computerised and all the graves have been accounted for. We estimate that approximately 100 available plots still exist at Long Lane. Several gravestones which are damaged at the rear of the Cemetery need to be reinstated, and an appeal has been made to relatives of families to come forward. In addition the Trustees are looking into ways to apply for grants to offset the costs of refurbishing and repairing the damaged stones and for renovation works. The former Ladies Guild at the Synagogue have continued their Friends of Long Lane committee to raise funds for the cemetery and their help is greatly appreciated.

At the same time, we are writing to all those members who have not yet contributed inviting them to see the progress that has been made and to assist us in our work.

As a quite separate issue, we maintain responsibility for the closed Cemetery at Green Lane, which is also owned by the former Trustees of the Synagogue, and a limited insurance policy is maintained.

We have a sacred duty of maintaining the Cemetery to an acceptable standard as a fitting resting place for our loved ones, and we do urge everyone to renew their voluntary contributions as promptly as possible, so that this work can be maintained.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

During the year the Charitable Company continued to maintain the grounds of the Cemetery at Long Lane, Liverpool, to an acceptable standard. Due to a generous donation from a family in New York, who were interested in the Beatles and the Epstein family, all of whom are buried at Long Lane, to continue renovations at the Cemetery. This enabled the removal of two diseased trees adjoining the Ohel, replaced the drains and the paving of the paths surrounding the Ohel, which has greatly improved the appearance of the Ohel. The car park has also been renewed and extended. There are plans to remove three further trees which have caused damage to graves, and hope to do this work during the next year. The Memorial Boards have been removed from the Synagogue and these are to be erected in the Ohel. All necessary burials, services and consecration of tombstones were supervised.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees/directors have made an initial assessment and have concluded that in view of the Charity's dependence on voluntary donations, reserves should be built up equivalent to six months running costs of the cemetery, plus anticipated longer term costs for the maintenance and security of the Ohel, grounds and surrounding walls. The charity needs to hold reserves of approximately £8,000 to meet six months running costs, and an additional £30,000 for the longer term maintenance and security of the ohel, grounds and surrounding walls. At the year ended 31 December 2014 the charity's unrestricted funds amounted to £42,147.

Financial Review

The Charity has continued to raise funds through voluntary income and charitable activities and continues to run the Cemetery in accordance with the objectives. Funds raised were £39,462 in the year (2013 £27,930) and expenditure was £23,051 (2013 £20,007).

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Further capital expenditure of approximately £1,500 is required to deal with the continuing problem of Japanese Knot Weed at the Cemetery at Green Lane. Further refurbishment is required, at Long Lane, and some vandalised graves need tidying up as well as trimming some trees that overhang some graves, and removing a further three trees. Further donations have been promised that will enable this work to be carried out.

We have been actively involved in continuing to seek a disposal of the Synagogue, and the adjoining site, and for any development to be consistent with the Grade II "Starred" listing of the Building.. During the year a valuation of the premises was undertaken in this regard. These discussion are on-going and when we have something specific to report, we will do so immediately.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINERS

A resolution to re-appoint Rachel Landsman as Independent Examiner will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
