Trustees' Report

Review of Developments, Activites and Achievements

As required by our charitable status, we remain focused on the consideration of public benefit and complying with the Charity Commission requirements.

The trustees are committed to fulfil the strategic intent of Wilstockhub: to design, build and operate a community centre. During this reporting period the charity has focused its efforts on raising the £1.2 million needed and we have made steady progress towards this goal. We have had two feasibility and design studies completed with an amended final design now going through the planning process. Throughout this process the design has been Community led, to meet the current and future needs of the community

Furthemore we have continued with our community outreach and ,as such, we have achieved:

- o With an 'Awards for All' fund we have been able to invest in our trustees and volunteers with essential training and skills. We have all learnt so much which has been invaluable.
- o The trustees held a very successful Stakeholders event putting us on the map with more opportunities for partnership working, their views helping us move forward productively, helping with strategic planning and decision making, which we will always review
- o Wilstockhub were chosen to be a case study for the 'Eden Project' due to the success of our 'Big Lunch' we hold annually for the community. Bringing people together, addressing loneliness and isolation, helping to tackle mental and physical health issues and building community resilience.
- o Events we have held throughout the year include: Easter egg Hunt, Stakeholders event, The Big Lunch, National Sports Day TeamGB and our Christmas activities.
- o We are building an 'In the meantime' Community until we have a building, by holding community events in our local park. Promoting cohesion, helping new residents to settle in and build awareness of the need for social interaction irrespective of age, race, religion or gender. Our events are free to attend, supported by donations and grant funding. We fundraise at our annual 'Big Lunch' with all proceeds going towards the construction of the community hub.
- o We have a home grown 'Events Management Team' of fantastic volunteers, all from within the community and are highly valued, the success of our events is down to our volunteers. Investing in them, not only gives them skills but it helps build their confidence, giving them opportunity and with some it is helping towards a return to work.

Trustees' Report

Structure, governance and management

Wilstockhub is a private company limited by guarantee without share capital. The company was incorporated April 2015 and is registered in England and Wales with company number 09566460.

The company obtained charitable status on July 2018 with - Charity number 1178906. The governing document is the memorandum and articles of Association.

The trustees can confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

The trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the charity.

All trustees give their time freely and receive no remuneration or other financial benefit.

Board meetings are held four times a year with additional meetings convened as required for decision making and matters arising between the four regular meetings.

The Wilstockhub holds an Annual General Meeting and aims to always be open and accountable.

Furthermore the trustees:

Understand their role and responsibilities.

Remain informed of changes in charity law and regulation.

Are committed to the charity's cause to help deliver Its purposes effectively.

Are satisfied any risks that have been identified, that systems are in place.

Ensure insurance is in place as is public liability.

Keep the finances under review.

Financial review

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. Due to the charity now requiring an independent examination, we have appointed an independent examiner of the financial statements. We are grateful for the assistance of Mr Phillip Spencer, a local accountant of over 30 years with extensive charity experience, for agreeing to provide this service probono

Income for the year amounted to £29,274 and, after expenditure totalling £17,446 the balance of £11,828 was added to funds brought forward of £4,168, leaving retained funds of £15,996. These funds comprise mainly cash at the bank as at the balance sheet date.

The amount accumulating in the bank account is earmarked for future spend such as on further design work for the hub and general community engagement.

Decisions on how to spend money are taken at board meetings and all activities considered within the parameters of the risk register and against our charitable objects.

Trustees' Report

Reserves policy

As a relatively new charity still establishing levels of income, we have not yet created a formalised reserves policy. However it should be noted that we do not have any creditors or financial commitments and therefore we can curtail our expenditure to ensure a healthy reserves level is maintained. As the charity develops, we would anticipate our annual expenditure to grow and consequently holding a reserve equivalent to 6 months' expenditure would appear prudent whilst the board considers the establishment of a formal policy. This policy will involve a review of anticipated spending against known levels of income, to determine our reserves requirement.

Overview

The first year operating as a charity has been impactful.

The what

Our aim is to build a Community Hub in a new development, currently housing approx. 4,000 residents with no facilities, building a hub will provide a way to deliver multiple services to meet the needs of the community.

The why:

Having held extensive community consultations, the residents have told us their needs, which has informed and given us our brief. This will ensure the design of the building is fit for purpose, bringing in vital services which are greatly needed to change people's lives whilst also enabling the local economy to flourish by encouraging local enterprise.

The difference we will make:

A community hub will be the heart of the community, empowering people, with opportunities to improve health and wellbeing. Social inclusion to help combat loneliness and mental health, having a sense of belonging with pride, creating greater community cohesion, housing associations will be able to build relationships with residents and the Police alike building rapport helping crime prevention, we can make such a phenomenal difference to people's lives, of all ages inclusively.

We have created a platform on which we can continue to build. It is with high thanks to 'Awards for All' who have allowed us in invest in essential training for our trustees and volunteers, building our confidence, skills and strength going forward together.

The trustees have an excellent relationship making a strong happy team, always open to new ideas, thinking outside the box and have great skills to offer between them, taking advise from professionals and others. All the trustees are proud of what has been achieved over the past twelve months, seeing the difference as the journey continues is very rewarding and keeps everyone motivated, dedicated and putting plans into action. It is agreed the board has good leadership, a clear strategy and great engagement.

The trustees recognize the importance of developing a range of partnerships, generating connections, enabling skills, knowledge and experience to be shared.

The trustees understand the struggle with bringing in funds to enable us to deliver our objects is a hard task, however, we are working with funders to support our clear need. Once we achieve our goal we will work towards become financially sustainable and self supporting.

Throughout our work we are aiming to reduce the carbon footprint of the community and be environmentally friendly in every way possible to help towards climate change to protect our natural world for our children of the future.

Trustees' Report

Wilstock and Stockmoor are on the edge of the Quantock Hills, an area of 'Outstanding Natural Beauty' we are a newly built community just off the M5. People move here for their dream house and location.

Is it fair to put people in this environment without facilities?

Wilstockhub charity is working on the solution, by aiming to deliver a building for the benefit of the community. We are community led and have been shaped by the needs of the community.

In particular we would like to thank Somerset Community Foundation and North Petherton Town Council for giving us the opportunity to work with them on funding applications and for the support from The Big Lottery and Livewest whose funding has made such a difference.

Thank you to everyone who has supported us in any way. We continue to learn, build on our strengths and be inspired by so many.

Future developments

Since the year end, the Wilstockhub has made substantial progress towards the aim of opening the community building. North Petherton Town Council, in which the Wilstock community resides, has voted to provide £150,000 to the project and we are immensely grateful for their continued support. In addition our funding application to the Somerset Community Foundation Hinckley Point C Community Fund has been successful with £300,000 committed to the project. This is the maximum contribution they can give to any one project and is a testament to the anticipated impact the Wilstockhub will have on the community.

The trustees continue to work on grant applications to a number of other local and national bodies for the remainder of the build cost and remain confident the fundraising target will be fufilled in next twelve months.

Finally the formal progress to transfer the land into the possession of the charity has commenced with the transfer and final amended planning permission expected to be granted in early Spring.

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation. The company gained charitable status on 22 June 2018.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

Wilstockhub meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

Income and endowments

All income is recognized once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probably that the income will be received and the amount of the income can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognized when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognized until either those conditions are fully met, or the fufilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is porbably that these conditions will be fufilled in the reporting period.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 April 2019

Grants receivable

Grants are recognized when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognized as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £100.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:
