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#### **DIRECTORS' REPORT**

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

The directors are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2021 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a trustees' report and accounts for Charity Law purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

## **Chairperson's Summary**

During the last year the effect of Covid-19 has had a devastating effect on individuals, communities and organisations like North Edinburgh Arts. Covid-19 dominated our work from March 2020.

Because of our experienced staff and Board we put in place a robust emergency Covid-19 plan, operational and with finances in place, working with our key funders, allowing us to support our community through difficult times, and secure the future of our organisation for the years ahead.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, North Edinburgh Arts has continued to flourish, ensuring NEA is at the heart of the community. Our vision continues to keep NEA at the centre of a creative, happy, healthy, kind, inspired and inspiring community.

Our revenue finances over the year have stabilised and strong relationships have been established and further grown with our main funders. I wish to thank all our supporters and funders who worked with us during Covid-19. The response to our request for resources to set up emergency provision was quick, flexible and supportive.

Because of this our full staff complement was in place across the past year, allowing us to be flexible in our response to Covid-19 but also to continue to produce a varied and strong creative programme. This was often carried out online, via producing delivering activity packs and by working outside.

NEA along with our partners became the heart of food production and delivery during Covid-19 emergency work across North Edinburgh. The theatre and gallery spaces were used for food/essentials/creative stock warehousing, with the studio spaces used for sorting and packing prior to doorstep delivery. The NEA cafe team worked to produce nutritious meals for chilling and delivery of over 14,000 meals across the summer. On behalf of the Board I would want to thank all the staff and volunteers for their unstinting dedication to help and support individuals and families in North Edinburgh. Well Done!!

The other key work for the staff and board has been working on a Community Asset Transfer. The has been successful which means the community of North Edinburgh now owns NEA building and the land. This is a great achievement and thanks go to the staff at the Scottish Land Trust for all their support and encouragement through this process.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

#### **Purposes**

The Company's Articles and Memoranda set out the following objectives:-

- a. To advance education through the promotion of the arts, particularly among the residents of the Greater Pilton area of North Edinburgh;
- b. To provide, in the interests of social welfare, facilities for recreation and other leisure time occupation available to the public at large within the Greater Pilton area of North Edinburgh, with a view to improving their conditions of life.

## Core aims and activities

Established in 1998 North Edinburgh Arts:-

- engages performing and visual artists to run projects and activities for personal and group development through, or in, the arts;
- works with city, national and international cultural organisations to make sure residents of the Forth Ward have access to their services;
- works with local partners to encourage cultural approaches to engaging young people, healthy living and well-being, and regeneration and the environment; and
- works with statutory and voluntary community planning partners to ensure regeneration plans reflect and respond to the cultural identity and life of the area and its residents.

# **Activities**

North Edinburgh Arts (NEA) runs a purpose built venue, opened in 2002, in the heart of Muirhouse, serving the Forth, Almond and Inverleith Wards. Pre-covid the venue was open for 52 hours per week with the award winning building incorporates two arts studios, a 96 seat theatre, recording studio, gallery, offices and a café with children's play area leading onto a large garden, with a craft/making space beyond hosting over 40,000 visits per annum, primarily from residents of the Forth, Almond and Inverleith Council Wards.

#### **Covid Response**

With the closure of the venue from the 23rd March 2020, due to the pandemic and acting on advice from the Scottish Government, NEA refocused its work on to the following areas:

- Production and distribution of ready meal packs to vulnerable, elderly and isolating residents (1,200 per week)
- Production and distribution of ambient food & essential household packs (30-50 per week)

## **Objectives and Activities (cont.)**

- Warehousing of ambient goods for distribution to partner organisations (stock value £64,000+)
- Production and distribution of creative and horticultural packs for all ages (200+)
- Development of an online creative programme, for all ages, including podcasts/zoom groups/ideas sheets and links to other creative products and activities (see newsletter links below for full details)
- Telephone and online support to existing group participants (150+ per week)

NEA was able to repurpose and maximise the resources to hand, i.e. staff and building, within three days, to address the immediate needs of vulnerable and isolating community members. Over the next month £175,000 was raised to deliver our own programme of work and assist the Covid-19 emergency work across North Edinburgh. £90,000 supporting in house activity and £85,000 distributed to partners to assist with area efforts.

The core NEA team, 23 in total, were assessed against government guidance with 7 furloughed, 7 managing the food/creative production and distribution at the venue (following a stringent risk assessment and safe work practices being established) and 9 working from home co-ordinating all supplies, internal communications, and external marketing. We retained all our freelance creative team and worked with them to develop the online programme. Additionally, we linked with Volunteer Edinburgh to engage 15 volunteers who assisted with all elements of this work.

The café, and NEA chef, worked to produce nutritious meals for chilling and delivery, as noted producing over 14,000 meals across the summer of 2020, with the theatre and gallery spaces used for food/essentials/creative stock warehousing, with space for sorting and packing prior to doorstep delivery. A focus was on establishing and maintaining a personal connection with recipients, to enable a service rooted in dignity offering bespoke support.

#### **Engagement & Partnerships**

Our engagement with our local communities took four strands:

- lively social media presence and regular lockdown newsletters, sharing stories of creativity across our community
- maintaining a physical presence and setting up a covid safe stall in the town square
- interactive zoom sessions led by freelance Artists focussing on stitching, writing, yoga and dance. This resulted in bespoke masks, and the publication of a collection of short stories.
- existing local intelligence to assess and address need quickly, including overlap and gaps between organisations operating on the ground

A weekly collaborative session was set up on zoom for all agencies working across the area, sharing knowledge, resources and piecing together a patchwork of provision to best effect. This resulted in three hard copy newsletters being produced by the partners, delivered to 5,000 homes.

We consulted about coming out of lockdown in Autumn 2020, to understand the conditions that would make our participants feel safe in visiting our space. Isolated and vulnerable residents could find getting back into public space challenging, adding to a sense of loneliness and despair. We recognised it was important as a venue to be visible and open, even if only able to accommodate small numbers.

We retained our freelance creative team and worked with them to develop the online/onsite programme with activity such as a writing programme, artist commissions, artist walks, dance and movement, horticulture, learning about wildlife and craft. We raised funds to enable the Create programme for 0-5s and their parents and carers, and the Play Rangers programme of creative play for 8year+ to start again in late August, utilizing outside our garden and outside. Genevieve Kay-Gourlay, Depute to Director, was given a place on the Creative Scotland Digital Pivot programme enabling her to work with our freelance artists to develop a blended programme of onsite and online learning.

We worked with the BLM Mural Trail, Edinburgh Art Festival, Edinburgh International Book Festival, National Galleries of Scotland and the Edinburgh International Festival to site physical artworks, distribute creative packs, and enhance uptake of these partner's online offer.

# **Community Asset Transfer and Capital Plans**

During this time the Director prepared the final stages of a successful bid to the Scottish Land Fund, and the corresponding Community Asset Transfer allowing the organisation to take the next step in securing the venue for community ownership and development. Linked to this plans were developed in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council for the MacMillan Hub building which will join the refurbished and expanded North Edinburgh Arts venue with new Council facilities. Together, through this development, NEA and the City of Edinburgh Council will provide

- enterprise, workshop, learning and creative studio space
- an expanded café, youth area and shared atrium
- new library and skills centre
- new early years centre supporting 185 local children
- new affordable homes including outdoor amenity space

This innovative partnership project between North Edinburgh Arts and the Council will provide key Council services whilst keeping NEA at the centre of a creative, connected and inspired community, with our building expanded and fit for purpose for the next generation of North Edinburgh residents.

#### **Grants payable policy**

During the year North Edinburgh Arts received funds from organisations to redistribute as grant awards to other organisations for their share of the outcomes delivered during the Covid pandemic. The amounts are non-recurring.

## **Achievements and Performance**

Alongside managing the emergency Covid response, maintaining our regular programme online, and utilising outside spaces, and re-opening the venue and garden when possible with covid safety at the forefront, the key achievements for the period April 2020 to March 2021 are as follows:

Pennywell Pantry Established as key response to the pandemic, the pantry supports around 350 households, reaching around 1,000 local people. Whilst the pantry's primary purpose was to use dignified food provision to reduce the cost of living, it has become a local hub supporting people in a range of other ways: to access other activities (e.g. Link Up groups, book provision, free Fringe tickets); increase social connection through the hub itself; and, create a safe space where people struggling with their mental health, substance abuse, housing and benefit issues can access support from our workers. The latter has been critical given the ongoing absence of other support services in the community, with many remaining online.

Pennywell Road Butterfly Garden North Edinburgh Arts was commissioned to create a new garden space from a temporary car park near to our venue on Pennywell Road. We engaged Artist Natalie Taylor, who has a wealth of experience in changing vacant spaces through sustainable design, to transform this patch of waste ground. Natalie worked to create a new bee and butterfly garden from the slabbed over space to mitigate the decline in insects, displaced by the new housing developments in the area. Natalie noticed that people often walked through the space on the way to or from the bus-stop so integrated a 'Desire Line' across the garden. The design focussed on finding the right plants that looking visually stimulating whilst offering bees, butterflies and other insects a place to feed. The garden hosts lavender, honeysuckle, verbena and oxeye daisies.

Open Project (aka. Art for Grown Ups) Art for Grown Ups, led by Artist Alice Betts, is a long-term project for Muirhouse and the surrounding areas, offering adults an opportunity to learn and develop creative skills together, while creating art for exhibition and public spaces. Art for Grown Ups is supported by Creative Scotland. Sessions involve a wide range of experimental and playful activities, creating both small, and large-scale artwork. Support with personal projects and creative goals can also be provided.

North Edinburgh Action Group involves four third sector organisations, and was established to demonstrate their commitment to collaboration and innovation in the delivery of services which tackle the long-term negative impacts of poverty. The Consortium's geographical reach ("North Edinburgh") extends across the communities of Muirhouse, Granton, Pilton and Drylaw. The delivery organisations consist of Fresh Start, North Edinburgh Arts, Move On, Spartans Community Football Academy. The proposed services to be delivered are:

- Creation of a cross organisational team of 4 Development Support Workers.
- Development and roll out of 1:1 assessment and person-centred planning protocols.
- Provision of intensive 1:1 support by DSWs, mentors, befrienders.
- Supported access to other existing services in the consortium and other partners.
- Supporting service users to engage in supported and open-ended volunteering.
- Facilitating service user involvement and participation at all levels of the service.
- Developing and sharing learning through the community research project.

**MacMillan Hub** North Edinburgh Arts is working in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council to create plans for an extended creative and community hub for the area, to be named the MacMillan Hub. The objective is to create a community and neighbourhood hub promoting culture, learning, work and well-being in and around the town centre.

The planning application has been approved for the full MacMillan Hub building which will join the refurbished and expanded North Edinburgh Arts venue. Together, through this development, NEA and the City of Edinburgh Council will provide

- enterprise, workshop, learning and creative studio space
- an expanded café, youth area and shared atrium
- new library and skills centre
- new early years centre supporting 185 local children
- new affordable homes including outdoor amenity space

This innovative partnership project between North Edinburgh Arts and the Council will provide key Council services whilst keeping NEA at the centre of a creative, connected and inspired community, with our building expanded and fit for purpose for the next generation of North Edinburgh residents.

# **Assessing Success**

Success is assessed via a number of ways:

Reaching targets set by our main funder; The City of Edinburgh Council set 28 tailored targets for the year under the following headings, all of which were achieved:

- Ensuring that everyone has access to world class cultural provision
- Encouraging the highest standards of creativity and excellence in all aspects of cultural activity
- Supporting greater partnership working in the cultural and creative sectors and maximise resources available to help them thrive all year round
- Articulating the positive impact to culture in Edinburgh and promoting Edinburgh's cultural success locally, nationally and internationally
- Developing and supporting the infrastructure which sustains Edinburgh's cultural and creative sectors
- Investing in artist and practitioner development, and supporting and sustaining the local artistic community

Additionally targets agreed with other funders, to include Creative Scotland, The Robertson Trust, and the National Lottery for Communities, are reported against. Each grant made to the organisation is assessed against targets, qualitative and quantitative in nature, that are set at the beginning of each period of support.

The organisation also collects quantitative data which is reviewed at Board Meetings and can be assessed year on year. These include hours open, number of activities offered, number of events hosted, number of users, café takings, % of tenants retained.

Participant feedback; NEA asks for feedback via evaluation forms after each programme, or in the case of the core programme at the end of each term. Additionally, the core programme activities and café receive feedback via our Facebook and twitter feeds. In the year 2020/21 feedback via social media was critical given the restrictions in place.

North Edinburgh Arts, along with local partners making up the 'Covid Response and Recovery Group' were awarded the Inspiring Partnership award at the Chamber of Commerce Awards ceremony 2021.

## **Financial Review**

## **Results for the Year**

North Edinburgh Arts' operation produced a surplus for the year of £59,407 (2020 – deficit of £3,821).

The total value of funds held at 31 March 2021 amounted to £475,200 (2020: £415,793) comprising £438,071 (2020: £394,570) of a restricted nature and £37,129 (2020: £21,223) of an unrestricted nature. Restricted funds include £256,341 Capital Funds (which will be released as depreciation over time).

## **Principal Funding Source**

The principal funding source was grant funding received from the City of Edinburgh Council amounting to £150,000 (2020: £140,956) and other grants as disclosed in note 6.

## **Reserves Policy**

It is the policy of the Directors to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at a level which equates to approximately three months unrestricted expenditure (around £60,000). Free reserves currently stand at £22,000 and the Directors are continuing to work towards increasing this amount.

## **Investment Policy**

The Directors consider that where surplus funds are available, they should be held in a suitable interest bearing bank account.

## **Risk Management**

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the charity, and the steps being taken to mitigate these risks, are as follows:

- a) Continued pressures to core funding, the Board and Director have a two-year budget forecast in place. The Board and Director established NEA as a strategic partner with the City of Edinburgh Council, agreeing an uplift funds, and in principle 3-year funding, 2019-2022.
- b) Capital build and partnership with City of Edinburgh Council. NEA's ambitious plans for redevelopment and extension, have brought our facility into community ownership. To mitigate the risks this brings the Board has been expanded to include fundraising and construction expertise, and capital fundraising support was enlisted.
- c) Pressures arising from Covid 19; NEA safely addressed issues arising from the pandemic, and will work to take this learning is taken into 2021 and beyond

### **Plans for the Future**

### **Going Concern**

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis as the Directors believe that the organisation will have sufficient funds to meet its ongoing financial obligations for at least twelve months from the signing of these financial statements. In making this assessment the Directors accept this is dependent upon the level of funding which is generated to meet the core costs of the organisation. Confirmation of core grant funding for 2021/22 has been received from the City of Edinburgh Council, and Creative Scotland, and work is in progress to secure further amounts through other appropriate partnership opportunities and fundraising opportunities.

The Directors have no reason to believe, based upon the actions and work that they have undertaken, that the funding necessary for the current year will not be secured, or that funding will not continue in future years, although they continue to plan for scenarios in which the level of funding may be reduced. This assessment of going concern includes the expected and ongoing impact of COVID-19 to the entity in the 12 months following the signing of these financial statements.

#### **Post Year End Events**

*Updated Articles of Association* The Director and Board worked with Burness Paull to update the organisation's Article of Association to ensure they were fit for the purposes of completing the Community Asset Transfer from the City of Edinburgh Council.

Donorfy Customer Management System The North Edinburgh Arts Team, and Board have developed a bespoke cloud based customer management system to streamline all matters relating to membership, ticketing, marketing, feedback and funding.

Festivals events NEA worked with Imaginate, Edinburgh International Science Festival, Edinburgh Fringe and Edinburgh International Book Festival to enhance access to their post covid programmes, and in the case of Imaginate and the Science Festival host site specific artworks.

Decant to temporary accommodation for the capital redevelopment A comprehensive decant plan has been put in place for the period January 2022 to August 2023 to ensure a smooth transition to temporary accommodation during the capital development of the existing venue. A mentor from Inspiring Scotland worked alongside the Director to assist with the planning.

## Structure, Governance and Management

#### Constitution

North Edinburgh Arts was incorporated in March 1998. The company is a charitable company limited by guarantee with no share capital. The company's purposes and powers are prescribed by, and it is governed in accordance with, its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company is recognised as a Scottish Charity.

## **Appointment and Induction of Directors**

Directors are elected under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association. Information packs, job descriptions for incoming Board Members and information on key tasks and responsibilities are provided as part of the induction process. Details of the Directors who were in office both during and since the year end are shown on page 9.

### **Induction and Training of new directors**

New directors are often already familiar with the practical work of the charity. New directors are provided with an induction pack and are offered training on the roles and responsibilities of Board Members run by a number of voluntary sector providers. Refresher and other training opportunities are offered on an ongoing basis.

# **Organisational Structure**

The Board of Directors is responsible for the strategic management of the company. The responsibility for operating North Edinburgh Arts Centre in accordance with that strategy rests with management. The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for the management of the organisation supported by her staff team. The Chief Executive Officer reports to the Board every 8-10 weeks. The Board undertakes an annual away day to review policy and operational strands of North Edinburgh Arts Centre business.

## Pay policy for senior staff

Senior staff are remunerated in line with industry norms along with any increments set out at time of recruitment, or awarded as a result of any additional training, qualifications or responsibility. Otherwise, increments are usually limited to annual cost of living increases across all pay scales.

#### **Opinion**

Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the director's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate. Our evaluation of all the directors assessment of the entities ability to continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting included assessing the clients budget and cashflow forecasts and obtaining confirmation from the parent that they will continue to support the company.

#### **NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

### For the Year Ended 31 March 2021

### 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

## **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019) — Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

North Edinburgh Arts meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recorded at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

#### Going concern

The charity relies upon grants and donations from outside sources in order to meet its day to day working capital requirements. The Directors have prepared financial projections until 31 March 2023. The income projections are based upon confirmed funding applications together with reasonable estimates of other income receivable, whilst expenditure forecasts are based upon known fixed costs together with reasonable estimates of expected costs based on prior experience. These projections indicate that the charity should achieve a break-even position for the forthcoming year and will be able to operate within their available facilities.

The Directors continue to review all costs of the organisation and ensure that these are kept to a minimum. They also continue to consider ways to increase the future funding of the charity both through grant applications and the hire of the Centre to other organisations.

Financial projections have been prepared until March 2023 on a prudent basis. The Directors have no reason to believe that their principal income sources will be materially reduced, or that the existing cost base will increase significantly and have prepared the projections on this basis. Based upon these assumptions, they are of the opinion that the charity should again be in a position to ensure that all expenditure is covered by income receivable during the year.

On the basis of the projections, the charity's results since the financial year end, the continued support of the company's principal funders and appropriate contingencies, if required, the Directors consider that the charity will be able to meet its liabilities as they fall due. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that would result if the company was unable to operate within the available facilities.

On the basis continuing to operate within the available facilities, the validity of the projected results and the continued support of the company's funders, the Directors consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis. This assessment of going concern includes the expected impact of COVID-19 to the entity in the 12 months following the signing of these financial statements.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (cont)

## **Income Recognition**

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Donations are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Donated assets are included in the Statement of Financial Activities where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable and measureable. The value of the donated assets is the estimated price the charity would expect to pay in the open market for the equivalent assets.
- Income from charitable activities are accounted for when earned in accordance with the date of the event.
- Income from grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled. Incoming resources where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.
- Income from use of premise is recognised in accordance with the date of the usage.
- Investment income is included when receivable.

## **Expenditure recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. The charity is not registered for VAT and, accordingly, expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include governance costs which support the Trusts programmes and activities. These costs include the expenses of Trustee meetings, the statutory audit and legal and professional fees. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities. Support costs are allocated on the basis of staff time and usage.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (cont)

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:-

Leasehold property - over the period of the lease

Fixtures and fittings - 14%, 20% and 33  $\frac{1}{3}$  %

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised at cost.

# **Pensions**

The Charity operates a Defined Contributions Pension Scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the Scheme.

#### **Company status**

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Directors named on page 10. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member for each member who is a member at the time of the winding up or within one year of the winding up.

#### **Funds**

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the Directors for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

# Designated funds:

The *Fixed Asset Fund* represents unrestricted capital expenditure and will be reduced by depreciation charged each year.

## Restricted Funds:

City of Edinburgh Council Urban Aid Capital Grant is a grant towards the capital development of the new build of the North Edinburgh Arts Centre.

Creative Scotland is a grant towards the costs of creating a new arts venue in North Edinburgh to provide a focal point/resource for arts development in the area.

City of Edinburgh Council Capital Grant is a grant towards the capital development of the new build of the North Edinburgh Arts Centre.

Scottish Enterprise Edinburgh and Lothian Arts Building Grant is a grant towards the capital development of the new build of the North Edinburgh Arts Centre.

Pilton Partnership is a grant towards the capital development of the new build of the Centre.

Lloyds TSB is a grant towards the fit-out and new crèche facility at the Centre.

Create is funded by the Scottish Government People and Communities fund. This project provides Art and Play development for under-5s and their families. This project offers local families the opportunity to participate in a series of creative plan and healthy eating workshops alongside the development days for parents, carers and family support practitioners.

NEA Theatre Project is funded by NHS Lothian and has been set up to engage a creative team to work with adult participants to develop performances. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Garden Development is funded by the Big Lottery and Scottish National Heritage. The half-acre plot, accessed from the central café, has been transformed from a patch of rough ground into a beautiful, welcoming and inspiring space for all to enjoy.

Film Club is supported by the Muirhouse Housing Association. The holiday film club screens family favourites in the NEA theatre. The club is free to attend and regularly attracts 60 plus. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Centipede. Muirhouse St. Andrew's Parish Church consulted with over 30 organisations and individuals to find ways of bringing the community of Muirhouse together. North Edinburgh Arts is a partner in this project which has gained funds to support local people to express issues and concerns in a creative way, provoke social activism that is fun, engaging and powerful, and to help existing organisations with their own projects.

Public Art Project is funded by Creative Scotland and Edinburgh & Lothian Health Foundation. This project has engaged Artists Hans Clausen and Lindsay Perth in residencies that are a part of the NW Edinburgh Partnership Centre development. The £12million centre, a joint development between NHS Lothian and the City of Edinburgh Council will bring increased health and social care services for the local community, including new GP accommodation and additional physiotherapy, podiatry, dentistry and child health services.

*Urban Union*. North Edinburgh Arts has been commissioned to develop an eight year strategy for the developers building 700 new homes in the square mile around our venue. This is part of the community benefits package agreed with the commissioners 21<sup>st</sup> Century Homes. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Play Rangers is funded by Inspiring Scotland. The Play Ranger programme encourages young people across the Forth Ward area to get involved in creative and child led play. Sessions take place in the community, on street corners, parks and open spaces. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Studio Ember is funded by Creative Scotland for the youth music initiative programme. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Cashback for Community is funded by YouthLink Scotland and aims to reinvest the proceeds of crime back into the communities to benefit young people. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Community Shed has been funded by the Scottish Government to improve the health and wellbeing of participants and promote repairing and reusing furniture and providing tools to participants. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Cycle Scotland has provided income in the year to promote cycling. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Stitch in Time funded by the National Lottery Community Fund 'Awards for All' this group works with craft specialists to explore all aspects of knitting and stitching. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Investing in Communities from the Scottish Government supports the work of the Link-Up project, which supports local people so that more of them can maximise their potential and bring about changes that reduce poverty and disadvantage. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Scottish Land Fund relates to the cost of the ongoing community payback, funding was received after the year end to cover the costs incurred to date.

COVID 19 Efforts During the pandemic a strong partnership developed between three partners of the wider North Edinburgh network, NEA, Freshstart, and Spartans. With support from the Community Anchor Organisation Fund, NEA worked with Freshstart and Spartans to scale up the provision and distribution of food packs & household essentials. This was due to recognition that organisations were reaching capacity, indicated by most partners not taking on new referrals. The local intelligence held and ability to network effectively ensured that

- a) The right goods reached the right place
- b) Efforts were co-ordinated and efficient
- c) The partners supported the work of other organisations in the area
- d) Appropriate planning and evaluation was in place.

With the funds we established three warehouse and distribution hubs, re-purposing space in our venues expanding capacity to provide weekly food packs and cooking equipment and providing enough fresh/dried, nutritious & enjoyable food for a week. This service ran for 16 weeks to the 13th August, and maximised the funds available via wholesale purchasing. The partners continued to support vulnerable residents after this date using other funds and inkind contributions.

NEA acted as the main warehouse £54,400 of stock delivered to and distributed from the space, sourced wholesale, and enhanced by contributions from Freshstart and Morrisons with NEA, Spartans, and Freshstart acting as local delivery hubs for collection and distribution to households. We engaged a wide range of trained volunteers, sourced via partner organisations and via Volunteer Edinburgh, with a warehouse co-ordinator overseeing stock and deliveries on seconded from the City of Edinburgh Council. To introduce as much choice as possible into the selection of food delivered to reflect personal and cultural preferences the fund was also used to engage Passion 4 Fusion, a social enterprise, who cooked and delivered food to BAME households across North Edinburgh.

Core Costs is funding received from the City of Edinburgh Council contributing to various core salaries and central overhead costs.

REACH -BoS Café grant grant is funding received from the Bank of Scotland to allow the Community Café to extend their daily opening hours to provide a longer service to the community.

Artists' Studio Funds raised by the Board at a silent auction, hosted by the Edinburgh International Festival at the Hub on the Royal Mile in November 2019 will be used for fixtures and fittings in the refurbished and extended venue.

The Open Project is funded by Creative Scotland and is established to allow local residents to explore their creativity in a safe and supportive place, working with Artists across discipline, with the aim of participants curating their own cultural events. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Pennywell Pantry Established as key response to the pandemic, the pantry supports around 350 households, reaching around 1,000 local people. The pantry's primary purpose is to use dignified food provision to reduce the cost of living.

Youth Arts Residents Five artists have been awarded the 2021/22 Youth Arts Residencies Small Grants, managed by North Edinburgh Arts (NEA) in partnership with Independent Arts Projects (IAP). The selected artists have each been awarded a grant of £5,000 to design and deliver their own youth arts projects in Muirhouse, North Edinburgh, supported through mentoring, advice and training. The programme will ensure accessible creative opportunities continue to exist, despite the COVID-19 pandemic, for children and young people living in Muirhouse. In addition, it aims to empower freelance artists, and strengthen and broaden NEA and IAPs longer-term connections with these practitioners. The programme is funded by Creative Scotland through the Youth Arts Fund Small Grants Scheme.

Kraftworks is funded by an Edinburgh Airport Fund grant. This project is for adults aged 16+ and runs weekly where participants learn practical and creative skills from professional artists to transform everyday, recycled materials from around your home.

Community Action North (formerly Community Leadership College) is funded by STV and delivered in partnership with Muirhouse Link Up. This project helps build on the biggest asset the community has — its people and gives them the opportunity to take participation and volunteering to the next level by providing training, support and other activities. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Outdoor Cinema A unique family friendly film event over two days making the most of two local resources, NEA and Screen Education Edinburgh, whilst ensuring children and families dependent on free school meals have access to food on non-school days. The four screenings, one outdoor and three in the NEA theatre, gave local residents the chance to get together with their neighbours to enjoy family favourites and a community meal. We also showed footage from the Screen Education Edinburgh Archive and films made by young people from across the area, to tie in with the 2018 Year of Young People. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents a contribution to core costs as agreed with the funder.

Spifox has funded the café redevelopment which has started in the year and is expected to finish in the next year. The transfer from restricted to unrestricted represents the fixed asset additions purchased utilising this grant.
